Acting & Collaborating to Tackle Intimate Violence

According to a study led by the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA, 2014), 1 in 3 women in Europe "has experienced physical and/or sexual violence since she was 15 years old" and 1 in 5 "has experienced physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence". A situation which has worsened following the Covid-19 crisis.

While women already face numerous discriminations in the job market, women confronted with domestic violence encounter a range of additional obstacles that make it more difficult for them to enter and maintain employment. Access to and sustaining stable employment are however basic conditions for the emancipation of women facing domestic violence. Financial autonomy, as well as support from a caring work environment (trained and aware about the problems of victims) are key elements that enable individuals to maximize their chances of getting out of a situation of violence.

The **ACTIV** partnership has noted the lack of collaboration between the different actors involved in the socio-professional (re) integration of women confronted with domestic violence. To offer women effective help, the project will facilitate the collaboration between the support and orientation structures as well as companies, who currently don't work together on this issue.
